The Healthcare Improvement Programme (HImP) for Foundation Doctors at Salisbury NHS Foundation Trust

Salisbury NHS Foundation Trust has established a programme to help F1 doctors learn basic

improvement skills by undertaking service improvement projects that also provide them with

experience of tackling the organisational complexities of delivering healthcare.

Participants choose projects in October each year from a brainstormed list of topics based on their

experiences of patient quality or safety. They work in action learning groups over the next nine

months designing and testing small improvements in their chosen area using principles and methods of healthcare improvement. Each group is supported by a pair of facilitators one of whom is a

hospital consultant and the other a senior member of another profession. A key underlying

paradigm is that the learners will leave a legacy of real improvement for the Trust and its patients as

well as having gained skills and experience they can use in the future. Projects are presented to the

hospital at a core Clinical Governance meeting the following July.

Projects so far include:

Improving processes for DVT risk assessment

Finding urgently needed equipment in treatment rooms

Locating notes and results of newly admitted patients in the Medical Assessment Unit to

make them easily accessible

Speeding up internal consultant to consultant referrals

The programme is beginning to attract a wide interest and Foundation Doctors have presented

papers at both national and international conferences.
